Introduction



Theme: Disobedience to the covenant will come at a cost to Israel - i.e., judgment through Assyria and Babylon. *But* there is always hope, God will fulfill His promises when His people respond with repentance and faith.

"Isaiah ministered in Judah c.740–686 B.C, during a time of great national crisis set in the tumultuous days of the Assyrian and Babylonian threats to Judah's future and the survival of the messianic line of the "house of David."

Isaiah has often been called the "Shakespeare of Israel" and the "Prince of the Prophets."

Isaiah ("Yahweh is salvation") was a prominent citizen in Jerusalem in the eighth century B.C.

Isaiah served during the reigns of four kings in Judah—Jotham (750–735 BC), Ahaz (735–715 BC), Hezekiah (715–686 BC), and Manasseh (686–642 BC). Israel and its capital city of Samaria fell to the Assyrians in 722 BC. The Assyrians took the people into exile and turned the land of Israel into an Assyrian province.

Introduction (continued)



Hezekiah rejected his father's pro-Assyrian policies and rebelled against Assyria. The Assyrian response was severe - Sennacherib invaded in 701 BC and captured 46 cities in Judah. Jerusalem was spared when the Lord destroyed the Assyrian army surrounding the city in response to the faith of Hezekiah who prayed for the Lord to deliver the city (2 Kings 18–19; Isaiah 36–37).

Tradition states that the wicked king Manasseh placed Isaiah in a hollow log and sawed it in half, and Heb 11:37 appears to makes reference to this event.

Next to Psalms, Isaiah is the most referenced Old Testament book in the New Testament, with approximately 100 citations

More than any other prophet, Isaiah anticipated the inclusion of Gentiles as participants in the blessings of the Lord's future salvation.

"The canonical witness of the New Testament confirms Isaiah's authorship of all parts of the book. Relevant New Testament references include Matt 3:3 (quoting Isa 40:3); Matt 4:4 (quoting Isa 9:1–2); Luke 4:17 (introducing a quote of Isa 61:1–3); John 12:39 (introducing a quote of Isa 53:1); Acts 8:28–35 (quoting Isa 53:7–8); and Rom 10:20 (quoting Isa 65:1).

KING HEZEKIAH / PRAYERS FOR DELIVERANCE (Isaiah 36-39)

These narratives dealing with the reign of Hezekiah, his passionate prayer, and the deliverance of Jerusalem from the Assyrian army in 701 BC

The Lord used Assyria to punish His people, but then He will deliver Judah from their enemy.

Hezekiah's faith was not perfect, and he often turned to political intrigue and military alliances in the midst of threatening circumstances (chaps. 30–31; 39), but in the end Hezekiah displayed great faith in the Lord as his sole source of security when the Assyrian army surrounded the city of Jerusalem in 701 BC.

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PROPHETIC CONSOLATION (Isaiah 40-66)

The first half of the book (Chs 1-39) is primarily a message of judgment, recording preached sermons, while the second half of the book (Chs 40-66) is predominantly a message of **comfort**, salvation and hope written in exquisite poetry.

Chapters 1–39 focused on trusting God in the midst of the Assyrian crisis rather than trusting military alliances or trusting in one's own strength. Chapters 40–66 argue that one should trust God alone. The Lord will raise up the Persian ruler Cyrus as His "anointed one" to secure Israel's release from exile (44:28–45:7). Cyrus, who reigned over Persia from 559 to 530 BC, would solve Israel's immediate problem by conquering Babylon and issuing the decree that would allow the Jews to return to their homeland (fulfilled in Ezra 1:1–5).

The larger issue impeding their restoration was the problem of Israel's sin and separation from the Lord. Rather than a conquering king, a Suffering Servant will accomplish Israel's ultimate restoration by giving His own life as a sin offering for the people

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PROPHETIC CONSOLATION (continued)

The prophet invites his audience into a courtroom as he demonstrates the superiority of the Lord to the gods of other nations with a sarcastic polemic to demonstrate the folly of idol worship.

Unlike unfaithful Israel, God's **individual Servant** will be obedient to God's instruction (50:4–5). Israel as God's Servant was blind and deaf (42:18), but the role of the individual Servant will be to open the eyes of the blind (42:7). While Israel suffered for its own sins (40:2; 42:24–25; 43:24–25; 44:21–22; 48:1–8), the Servant will suffer for the sins of others (53:4–6,10–12).

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He will feed His flock like a shepherd; He will gather the lambs with His arm, And carry them in His bosom, And gently lead those who are with young. Isaiah 40:11

"He gives power to the weak, And to those who have no might He increases strength. Even the youths shall faint and be weary, And the young men shall utterly fall, But those who wait on the Lord Shall renew their strength; They shall mount up with wings like eagles, They shall run and not be weary, They shall walk and not faint."
